

Arcata's Historic Preservation

In the early 1970s the lowering of voting age from 21 to 18 created a major change in college towns including Arcata. In 1972 Dr. Rudy Becking and Alex Stillman were elected to the Arcata City Council. Two years later Wesley Chesbro and I were elected, creating a progressive or liberal majority for the first time in Arcata history. In 1978 Sam Penisi replaced Dr. Becking, maintaining that majority.

In the midst of all this, some of us wanted to proceed with a Historic Preservation program. A number of historic homes had already been demolished, and others were threatened to make



way for newer homes, apartments and businesses. We soon realized that a mandatory preservation ordinance could trigger legal actions from inverse condemnation. The ordinance was made voluntary but with a provision that there would be a 30-day delay before any demolition permit could be granted. Even that delay provision brought out angry opposition. In particular, I remember the angry rant of Doris Chapman Ritchie, the owner of the Chapman House. Doris demanded the right to destroy the Chapman House any time she wanted to.

Has the historic preservation program worked? I would argue that overall it has worked. There has seemed to be an awareness of the value of our historic structures. That awareness was enhanced by the City Council commissioning a survey and book by historian Susie Van Kirk titled Reflections of *Arcata's History: Eighty Years of Architecture*, published in 1979.

Ironically, a few years ago, Doris Ritchie's son sold the Chapman House to Scott and Sandy Hunt. The Hunts did a fantastic restoration of the property, maintaining the historical integrity of the home. The Chapman House is one of the finest older homes in Arcata (photo above).

We have still lost one structure, the Derail House, at 12th and I Streets, due to aggressive neglect. We still have apartments in front of beautiful Victorians that should have been removed. While not perfect, Historic Preservation has worked well for Arcata.

Historic Preservation month is in May and the Historical Landmarks Committee has plans to use Steve Lazzar's postcards to tell their story of Arcata history.
